FREE Day

Kid Enrichment Day

This year was our first ever Kid Enrichment Day! The program consisted of a tiger tour, an enrichment presentation, time for kids to construct their enrichment items for the tigers, and everyone's favorite part, giving the tiger's their enrichment creations! Kids learned what enrichment is and how carefully constructed each item must be. Enrichment is anything that provides stimuli to an animal and causes them to react in a natural way. We talked about the types of materials you can use for enrichment and other items that are dangerous for tigers. Kids then had to use "tiger safe" materials to create their items. Such materials included; paper towel tubes, boxes, peanut butter (which makes nice glue), spices and scents, leaves, fruit, meat, and paper. Izzy and Alexis enjoyed their items the most! Reporting Big Cat Abuse

As a sanctuary it is our responsibility to take care of abused and neglected cats but it is also our responsibility to teach the public about big cat abuse. Educating the public is important to prevent and stop the cycle of abuse. Sometimes big cat abuse is hidden behind lies or even behind good intentions. For instance, tiger petting displays may not seem inherently harmful if the cubs are being taken care but when you dive deeper into the situation the abuse becomes more evident. Where do they get these cubs? How often are they breeding tigers to keep a constant display of cubs? What do they do with the cubs once they outgrow their job? The USDA only allows cubs to be handled by the public between the ages of 8 weeks and 12 weeks. What happens after they've outgrown their four week job? Many are euthanized (which almost happened to Izzy), sold as pets, or kept in poor conditions in "sanctuaries". When you start finding answers to these questions, you may be surprised to learn that something as simple as petting a tiger can be abuse. So next time you see an exotic pet carnivore, a tiger cub display, circus, carnival, road side zoo, or any other display please look beyond what you see in front of you and ask yourself is this animal cruelty? If you do believe that you are seeing animal cruelty here are some steps you can take to help the animal.

Always check with the county and state's exotic animal laws. Unfortunately many states have inadequate laws to protect exotic animals.

If the animal is in immediate danger call your local animal control or local law enforcement.

If you can take pictures to provide as evidence and be prepared to testify. Animals cannot speak for themselves so it makes a much better case if you can testify on the animal's behalf.

In Missouri, enforcing animal abuse laws is the responsibility of local police or county officers. Find police and sheriff contacts here: http://ago.mo.gov/policesheriffs/

My name is Kaitlin from St. Louis, MO and I spent my summer interning at the Crown Ridge Tiger Sanctuary. I am going to school as a Zoology major at Northwest Missouri State University. Interning at the sanctuary has been an extraordinary experience. Being an intern at the sanctuary is so much more than just playing with tigers all day and cleaning up after them. I have learned everything from caring for the cats, to feeding them, to cleaning up after them, to regular ground maintenance of the entire sanctuary. I participated in cleaning the enclosures everyday as well as working on enrichment projects for the cats to invite them to experience new things all the time. I helped in preparing their diets. Sometimes, this is as simple as opening prepackaged meat and weighing it out. Other times I have helped in completely processing a cow which entails having to skin it and prepare it for feeding to the cats. I thought this was going to be the hardest part of this job, but I actually didn't mind it. Being a biology major I enjoyed looking and cutting though the body parts of the cow as we processed it. What I did have a hard time with was determining if some meat was bad and could not be fed to the cats. It is not always about the cats though, but about their environment around them as well. We help keep the sanctuary clean and inviting for the public to come and visit by taking care of the grounds. This includes mulching, planting flowers, cleaning the pool, etc. Out of everything, safety is one of the most important things at the sanctuary, whether it is for the public, the workers, or the cats themselves. My favorite part about working at the sanctuary is how small and personal it is allowing me to get that hands on experience to get to know each of the cats and learn each of their personalities. Leaving the sanctuary is the hardest part and I thank the Crown Ridge staff for allowing me to be a part of their family this summer.

Freezers Needed!


